SUPPORTING TEACHERS

On December 4th, Bradford teachers welcomed Dallas Hetherington from C-Change Conversations, a non-partisan organization that focuses on climate change education. Dallas provided an important and informative overview of our current climate crisis.

CURRICULUM SUPPORT



In February, 10 classrooms received worm hotels, curriculum support, and books to learn more about these crawly creatures and how they work to compost our soil.



In March, 12 classrooms received seed trays and are learning all about plant lifecycles. They will attempt to grow different kinds of veggies and flowers and then plant them as seedlings into our raised beds. Big thanks to Zi Mei for supporting us with many seeds!



6 teachers have thus far signed up to monitor seedlings in a full or half raised bed this Spring!



On Monday, March 25th, Van Vleck Director of Education, Michelle Weissner, provided Bradford teachers with ideas and examples of how to utilize Bradford's outdoor space as a unique experiential learning environment. Teachers will have the opportunity to discuss challenges and ask questions on how to begin teaching lessons in an outdoor space, as well as how to enhance and expand lessons for those teachers already comfortable bringing their students outdoors.

A NEW APPROACH TO RAISED BEDS


>>> HISTORY OF RAISED BEDS AT BRADFORD

In years past, individual teachers have been responsible for organizing and planting a raised bed. The feedback we received from teachers has been that more teachers would get involved if they were provided a plan and materials. What has happened in years past is that we end up with multiple beds that have the same contents. We have 11 total raised beds, each of which are in a different status of functioning. We have decided to wait to fix any more of the bins until the playground redesign is more clearly defined as we do not currently still know if any of the bins will need to be moved.

WHAT IS COLLECTIVE GARDENING?

A collective gardening approach involves coming up with an overall master plan for the beds (what goes where) and supporting teachers in their involvement in the beds.

- · First, we have identified vegetables and plants that are harvestable during school months (April June in Spring and September through November in Fall).
- Second, we have organized the beds via themes (see below): sensory, pollinator, climbing, edible, herb, etc. to hopefully engage and interest as many students as possible.
- Finally, we hope that through the Plant Lifecycle curriculum program for teachers, classes will grow their seeds into seedlings, affording students the opportunity to plant their seedlings in the garden.





>>> WORM COMPOSTING

The raised bed outside of Dr.Cahill's room will be the home of our new worm composter. Many thanks to Ben Watson for installing and overseeing this project. We hope as a result, to generate nutritious soil that will help supplement all of our garden beds.

>>> ACCREDITATIONS

We have officially applied to be added to the Pollinator Pathway and recognized as a Monarch Waystation. To be recognized as a site on the Pollinator Pathway, an entity must be a pesticide-free site and offer native plants that provide nutrition and habitat for pollinating insects and birds. Monarch Waystations are places that provide resources necessary for monarchs to produce successive generations and sustain their migration. Our garden currently has three different kinds of milkweed and we are hoping to expand that to six this vear.

>>> SIGNAGE

We hope to have our official sign and the mosaic border installed later this Spring. We are working with the North East Earth Coalition (NEEC) to develop similar signage to display in front of our garden to educate children and the public on what cultivars are present and why native and pollinator plants and gardens matter.


